

USBE will continue to offer the current Reading Endorsement Level 1, Reading Endorsement Level 2 Advanced, and Reading Endorsement Level 2 Interventionist only until June 2023.

(June 30, 2023 is the last day to submit applications for the current reading endorsement that is being retired.)

Beginning this year, USBE is offering a new Secondary Literacy Interventionist Endorsement and a new K-12 Literacy Specialist
